Film & Television Updates

THE CHET & BERNIES SERIES (DOG ON IT): This canine-narrated noir mystery series, currently in its 10th installment, has recently been optioned by a major TV network with Carol Mendelsohn, the creator of the 16 year *CSI* franchise, attached to write and produce.

MY NAME IS LUCY BARTON: Following a sold out and critically beloved first run, *and* a revival, the theatrical adaptation of Elizabeth Strout's recent novel is in its final days of a smash hit Broadway run, where it opened to reviews that proclaimed Laura Linney's performance a "tour de force" (Chicago Tribune) and observed that "Linney and Strout are almost seamlessly well-matched." (New York Times)

THE RETURN: Pitched as Sex and the City meets The Shining, this genre-bending debut novel from Rachel Harrison is currently in development as a TV series (details to follow public announcement). Berkley will publish in hardcover on March 24th (Publisher controls translation rights).

DONNA HAS LEFT THE BUILDING: Susan Jane Gilman's rowdy, big-hearted second novel is now in development for a TV series with a fierce team of female creatives attached, including a Director, an Executive Producer and a Writer, with details to follow. (Published by Grand Central, who controls translation rights)

THE LATE BLOOMER'S REVOLUTION: This memoir by Amy Cohen was originally published by Hyperion Books in 2007, and an excerpt was published in the *NYT's Modern Love* column that same year. Last April, the *Modern Love* excerpt was broadcast as a podcast episode with Natasha Lyonne (*Russian Doll*) narrating; it has now been optioned by Amazon Studios for possible inclusion in future seasons of their network series, *Modern Love*.

JUST DON'T FALL: Josh Sundquist wrote this memoir for adults, which was published by Viking in 2010, and then followed it with another memoir (this one for YA readers) which was published by Little Brown Books for Kids in 2014. The two memoirs are now in development as a TV series under the title "Just Don't Fall" with a major streaming network (details to follow).

Alice Holtzman is demographically unfashionable: middle-aged, childless, introverted, and more concerned with a job well done than how she looks doing it. After the sudden death of her husband, she starts having panic attacks. It's in the grips of one of these attacks that she hits Jake—a troubled, paraplegic teenager with the tallest mohawk in the Pacific Northwest—with her pickup truck. Oh, and did we mention that truck was full of 120,000 restless honeybees?

Everyone is surprised when Alice lets Jake move onto her farm, and even more surprised when she hires Harry, a bumbling twenty-something with a troubled past, to help her with her apiary. When a nefarious pesticide company threatens the local honeybee population, this unlikely trio unites to defend the bees, and, in the process, forge a path out of their respective griefs.

With a strong beating heart like that of Vanessa Diffenbaugh's *THE LANGUAGE OF FLOWERS*, *BEE MUSIC* is about the families we choose for ourselves. The book's earnestness is tempered by the real pain that the characters feel, and the ways they come together is like a template for healing. Eileen Garvin is a masterful storyteller and it's impossible not to root for dear Alice, Jake, and Harry!

BROOD

Jackie Polzin (Doubleday/Spring 2021)

In the first debut novel auction of the year, BROOD has found its home with Doubleday, following an auction between eight publishers. Jackie Polzin's literary debut follows an unnamed narrator's stubborn attempt to keep her small brood of four chickens alive and safe over the course of one savage winter in Minnesota. Woefully unprepared for the task, she battles the relentless predators, severe weather and unforeseen bad luck—all the while grieving a recent miscarriage, and coming to terms with her infertility and the accompanying uncertainty that her future holds.

There is a brutal beauty to this novel, brought into crisp focus by Polzin's dazzling prose. In its way of braiding grief with the care of birds, BROOD has drawn comparisons to *H IS FOR HAWK*, while Polzin's prose has been likened to Rachel Cusk, Jenny Offill, and to Lucia Berlin, with whom she shares an appraising eye and a disarming sense of humor.

Jackie Polzin is a recent graduate of the Boise State MFA program, and she has studied under Emily Ruskovich, Brady Udall and Joy Williams, who have read and championed early versions of this novel. She currently lives in St. Paul, Minnesota with her husband and children. BROOD is her first novel.

THE KNOCKOUT QUEEN

A dazzling and darkly comic novel of love, violence, and friendship.

Bunny Lampert is the princess of North Shore—beautiful, tall, blond, with a rich real-estate-developer father and a swimming pool in her backyard. Michael—with a ponytail down his back and a septum piercing—lives with his aunt in the cramped stucco cottage next door. When Bunny catches Michael smoking in her yard, he discovers that her life is not as perfect as it seems. At six foot three, Bunny towers over their classmates. Even as she dreams of standing out and competing in the Olympics, she is desperate to fit in, to seem normal, and to get a boyfriend, all while hiding her father's escalating alcoholism.

Meanwhile, Michael has secrets of his own. At home and at school he pretends to be straight, but at night he meets men online for anonymous encounters that both thrill and scare him. When Michael falls in love for the first time, a vicious strain of gossip circulates and a terrible, brutal act becomes the defining feature of both his and Bunny's futures—and of their friendship. With storytelling as intoxicating as it is intelligent, Rufi Thorpe has created a tragic and unflinching portrait of identity, a fascinating examination of our struggles to exist in our bodies, and an excruciatingly beautiful story of two humans aching for connection.

RUFITHORPE is the author of three novels. Her first, *The Girls from Corona del Mar*, was long-listed for the 2014 International Dylan Thomas Prize and for the 2014 Flaherty-Dunnán First Novel Prize, and became a National Bestseller. She holds an MFA from the University of Virginia and lives in California with her husband and sons.

New York Times bestselling author Lesley M.M. Blume reveals how a courageous reporter uncovered one of the greatest and deadliest cover-ups of the 20th century—the true effects of the atom bomb—potentially saving millions of lives.

In the days following the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the Japanese surrendered unconditionally. But even before the surrender, the US had begun a secret propaganda campaign to celebrate these weapons as the ultimate peacekeepers—hiding the true extent and nature of their devastation. The cover-up intensified as Americans closed the atomic cities to Allied reporters, preventing information from leaking about the horrific and lasting effects of radiation which would kill thousands of people during the months after the blast. For nearly a year the cover-up worked—until New Yorker journalist John Hersey got into Hiroshima and reported the truth to the world.

As Hersey and his editors prepared his article for publication, they kept the whistleblowing story secret—even from most of their New Yorker colleagues. When the magazine published “Hiroshima” in August, 1946, it became an instant global sensation, and inspired pervasive horror about the weapons that had been covertly waged in America’s name. Since 1945, no nuclear weapons have ever been deployed in war in part because Hersey alerted the world to their true, devastating impact. This knowledge has remained among the greatest deterrents to using them since the end of World War II.

Released on the 75th anniversary of the Hiroshima bombing, *Fallout* is an engrossing detective story, as well as an important piece of hidden history that shows how one heroic scoop saved—and can still save—the world.

A woman whose name shouldn't be Linda lives in a city she can't stand, her every movement tracked by her father, a reluctant but duty-bound protector who was horrified to learn of her existence 14 years earlier, when Linda emerged from the woods as a feral child.

She'd been raised in total isolation by her brilliant but dangerously unhinged mother, who birthed her in a grief-ridden attempt to replace her deceased firstborn daughter. The internet obsessed over Linda's sudden appearance, labeling her #CloneGirl. The misnomer haunts Linda still, and as an adult, she struggles to interact with people and strives to lead a quiet life.

And then a new neighbor moves in and changes everything. For the first time, Linda sees the potential of true friendship, and through her neighbor is drawn into the escapism of virtual reality. But just as she's easing into a new sense of belonging, Linda is kidnapped and taken to a remote location where she will ultimately be forced to confront the truth of her traumatic past.

REMEMBER THIS is a wrenching portrait of parental grief, a daring proposal on how memory functions, and an examination of whom we trust with our own histories.

I GIVE IT TO YOU

“Do you like it?” she said. ‘I give it to you.’”

American novelist Jan Vidor arrives at Villa Chiara in Tuscany intent on learning Italian, touring the hill towns, and casting about for a subject for her next book. Jan is well acquainted with the unwelcome effusions of strangers who offer their personal histories for her fiction. But in their first meeting, her aristocratic landlord Beatrice Salviati Doyle makes a passing remark about violent events at the villa during World War II, and Jan finds herself wanting to know more. Further conversations reveal Beatrice to be a complicated woman with a knack for telling stories about the past. Routinely, and then vehemently, Jan takes notes. Soon she is investigating leads like a detective, documenting the decline of a once powerful family through the vicissitudes of two wars and three generations.

As Jan reconstructs the past, Beatrice is absorbed in securing the future of the family estate. What neither of them knows is that behind the bucolic scrim of daily life at the villa, a plot is being hatched that will deal the final death blow to the Salviati patrimony.

For Jan, her friend’s family history is an irresistible account of class struggle; it’s a story she wants to tell. It doesn’t occur to her that Beatrice regrets having told it, or that she might consider Jan’s version a betrayal of trust. Isn’t stealing other people’s lives the business of a novelist? Jan has no illusions about the answer to this question. It’s yes. It’s always yes.

VALERIE MARTIN is the author of twelve novels, including TRESPASS, MARY REILLY (a major motion picture starring Julia Roberts), and PROPERTY, four collections of short fiction, and a biography of St. Francis of Assisi . She has been awarded numerous prizes for her work, including the Kafka Prize (for MARY REILLY) and Britain’s Orange Prize (for PROPERTY.) She resides in Connecticut and is currently Professor of English at Mt. Holyoke College.

IN PARIS

Soon she meets an elegant dog, a German shorthair pointer named Frida, who knows how to get by in the city without attracting the attention of suspicious Parisians. Paras and Frida coexist for a time in the city’s lush green spaces, nourished by Frida's strategic trips to the butchery and the bakery. They keep company with two irrepressible ducks, and by an opinionated crow. But then Paras meets a human boy, Etienne, and discovers a new, otherworldly part of Paris: the secluded, ivy-walled house where the boy and his nearly-one-hundred-year-old great grandmother live, quietly and unto themselves. As the cold weather and Christmas near, the unlikeliest of friendships bloom among humans and animals alike. But how long can a runaway horse live undiscovered in Paris? And how long can a boy keep her hidden, and all his own? Jane Smiley’s beguiling new novel is itself an adventure that celebrates curiosity and ingenuity, and expresses the desire of all creatures for true friendship, love, and freedom.

JANE SMILEY is the author of numerous novels, including A THOUSAND ACRES, which was awarded the Pulitzer Prize, and most recently, SOME LUCK, EARLY WARNING, and GOLDEN AGE. She is also the author of several works of nonfiction and books for young adults. A member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters, she has also received the PEN Center USA Lifetime Achievement Award for Literature. She lives in Northern California.

Meanwhile, Benny has begun to hear voices, many of them generated by the vast piles of paper and books that his mother refuses to part with. Narrated by both Benny and the book itself, THE BOOK OF BENNY OH is a story that interrogates space in much the same way that A TALE FOR THE TIME BEING interrogated time: with characters who are deeply human, a structure that is both wildly ambitious and essential to its power, and always at its core, informed by Ozeki’s compassion and philosophical curiosity.

Anna Obata is a biracial teenager living in economically depressed Southern Japan just before the millennium. Left to fend for herself (and to look after her increasingly senile Grandfather) Anna copes with her devastating loneliness by calling upon her strongest inner resource: imagination. This is the story of girl who falls in love with a satellite, yes—but it is also the story of how the human mind attempts to repair itself, no matter the cost, no matter the odds. Told in alternating perspectives by Anna, the satellite, and several others, SATELLITE LOVE is exquisitely strange and refreshingly unconventional.

Genki Ferguson was born in New Brunswick, Canada to a family of authors (his father is author Will Ferguson), and grew up reading Murakami. He spent much of his childhood in the subtropical island of Kyushu, Japan, where his mother's family still resides. Fluent in Japanese and capable of making a decent sushi roll, Genki was also the recipient of the 2017 Helen Pitt Award for visual arts and is finishing a degree in Film Production, while working part-time at Book Warehouse, an indie store in Vancouver.

Sold at auction and already met with unbridled enthusiasm from the poetry community, RESPECTING THE MIC is an anthology of new poems from the students and alumni of the Spoken Word Club. Founded two decades ago by Oak Park River Forest High School teacher, Peter Kahn, the club has changed the trajectory of thousands of students' lives. Peter made the simple yet groundbreaking decision to bring poetry slams into his classroom and saw introverts and reluctant learners turn into youth poet laureates (Kara Jackson), NBA basketball players (Iman Shumpert), and comedy stars (Langston Kerman). No less important are the many obstacles that the Spoken Word Club urged its members to confront - abuse, mental health, sexuality and identity crises, incarcerated parents, bullying... the list, unfortunately, goes on.




