FAT TIME is the powerful new collection from PEN/Faulkner Award finalist Jeffery Renard Allen. Encompassing ten short stories, the collection is loosely linked around African notions of time and place, along with African views of space, cosmology, and metaphysics. The stories are set in invented locations in both Africa and America and play out over a continuum of time. A deeper linkage emerges in the form of a shadow narrative about, on the one hand, destruction in the specific form of violence to the Black body, and on the other, creation and making, namely through the idioms of music and painting.

Allen daringly weaves in elements of both historical fact and the fantastic throughout FAT TIME. “Paraphernalia” relays the surprising results when the daughter of a religious leader convinces the world heavyweight boxing champions to host her sixteenth birthday party at his home. Familiar figures come into focus throughout too: in the title story “Fat Time” (previously published on *Granta.com*), Allen riffs on the boxer Jack Johnson, while Jimi Hendrix and Francis Bacon play central roles in “Heads” (previously published in the *Oxford American*). Taken together, these ten stories represent a contemporary master at the top of his craft.

Jeffery Renard Allen is the author of five books including the novels SONG OF THE SHANK and RAILS UNDER MY BACK, which won the Chicago Tribune’s Heartland Prize for Fiction; the short story collection HOLDING PATTERN, which received The Ernest J. Gaines Award for Literary Excellence; and two collections of poetry. A Professor of Creative Writing at the University of Virginia, Allen is the recipient of a Whiting Writers’ Award, a grant in Innovative Literature from the Creative Capital Foundation, and a Guggenheim Fellowship.

Breena Clarke grew up in Washington, D.C., and was educated at Howard University. For ANGELS MAKE THEIR HOPE HERE, she drew inspiration from the tales and legends of the settlers of the Ramapo Mountains, not far from her home in New Jersey. Breena Clarke is the author of RIVER, CROSS MY HEART—an Oprah’s Book Club selection and New York Times bestseller which has sold more than 700,000 copies—and STAND THE STORM.

She has practiced Chinese medicine for over three decades and is the author of *Five Spirits: Alchemical Acupuncture for Psychological and Spiritual Healing*; *Kigo: Exploring the Spiritual Essence of Acupuncture Points Through the Changing Season*. Mary Rodgers and Jesse Green – SHY: The Alarming Outspoken Memoirs of Mary Rodgers

Richard Rodgers was perhaps the greatest composer in the history of American musical theater. Adam Guettel is the light of a new generation extending and reinventing that tradition. At their intersection stands Mary Rodgers Guettel: Rodgers's daughter, Guettel's mother, a noted composer, author, and arts doyenne in her own right and the sharpest tongue in show biz.

More than just a unique witness to the flowering of everything from *Oklahoma* to *The Light in the Piazza* (with her own *Once Upon a Mattress* sandwiched in between), more than just family and friend (and sometimes enemy) to all the biggest names in the theater for 60 years, she was among the last and best examples of a classic American voice: beholden, passionate, warm, deeply knowledgeable, and devastatingly pointed. As such, the posthumous book in which she stars is broader than a memoir, more personal than a biography, more true than a novel, yet contains elements of each.

Jesse Green is the chief theater critic for *The New York Times*. From 2013 to 2017 he was the theater critic for *New York* magazine, where he had also been a contributing editor, writing long-form features, since 2008. Before that he wrote about theater and culture for the Arts & Leisure section of *The Times* while covering broader subjects for the *Times Magazine*. He is also the author of the novel *O Beautiful* and the memoir *The Velveteen Father: An Unexpected Journey to Parenthood*.

Padgett Powell – INDIGO: Arm Wrestling, Snake Saving, and Some Things in Between

Padgett Powell is the author of nine works of fiction, making INDIGO: Arm Wrestling, Snake Saving, and Some Things in Between, his very first, very welcome collection of nonfiction. "Cleave Dean" (previously published in *Harper's*) takes Padgett to Sweden and the World Armwrestling Federation Championships, where Dean, a Georgian, is hoping to regain his previous title. The closing piece, which first appeared in *Garden & Gun*, charts Padgett's lifelong fascination with the endangered Indigo snake, "a thinking snake," and his obsession with seeing one in the wild.

As for some things in between: Powell turns his pen to consider artists like Grace Paley, William Wegman, and Flannery O'Connor; mulls over why he's been writing about a certain Texas dog named Spode for twenty-two years; and generously offers the reader a recipe for "Using the Squirrel God Gave You." In all, his surrealistic and comical terrain is grounded by a preoccupation with longing, fear, work, loneliness, and cultural nostalgia. Every piece deftly delivers the same idiosyncratic brilliance that has earned Powell praise from the likes of Donald Barthelme, Gary Shteyngart, John Jeremiah Sullivan, and many more. Pete Dexter, author of DEADWOOD and SPOONER, will provide the collection's introduction.

Padgett Powell is the author of six novels (including *The Interrogative Mood*, *You & Me*, and *Edisto*, a finalist for the National Book Award) and three story collections. His writing has appeared in the *New Yorker*, *Harper's Magazine*, *Little Star*, and the *Paris Review*, and he is the recipient of the Rome Fellowship in Literature from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, a Whiting Writers' Award, and the James Tait Black Prize in fiction, the UK's oldest literary award.

Mary South – UNTITLED NOVEL

Mary South's debut novel documents a world in which women are turning into common household objects, such as vacuums, microwave ovens, and flatscreen televisions. The novel's protagonist observes this process of transformation into the mundane while she works as a nurse at a hospice for women of the 1%, where only the rich and the famous can receive adequate care while enduring such a painful and unusual change.

Through her work with the transforming and transformed, the nurse, whose own mother is turning into a television, bears witness and somehow also learns to more fully inhabit her own life. Conceived as Kazuo Ishiguro's NEVER LET ME GO meets J. G. Ballard's CRASH, with Katherine Dunn's GEEK LOVE mixed in, South's unsettling novel is an eerie and dark sendup of our first-world capitalist culture, where the consequences of our toxic habits and malignant carelessness are supernaturally manifested first upon the female body. Through its absurdist premise, it also mines the manner in which we cope with illness and our increasing reliance on immediate gratification and disposability.

Mary South is the author of the short story collection *You Will Never Be Forgotten*, published by FSG Originals and available or forthcoming in the UK, Italy, and Korea. She is a graduate of the MFA program in fiction at Columbia University. For many years, she has worked as an editor at the literary journal NOON. Mary is also a former intern in *The New Yorker's* fiction department and a Bread Loaf work-study fellow. Stories from *You Will Never Be Forgotten* appeared in *The New Yorker*, *American Short Fiction*, *Guernica*, *The Baffler*, and *Los Angeles Review of Books*, among others. The writer Maile Meloy awarded her story "Not Setsuko" an honorable mention in the *Zoetrope: All Story* fiction contest. Film rights to her story "The Age of Love" were optioned by Anonymous Content.

Elvia Wilk – DEATH BY LANDSCAPE: Essays

Elvia Wilk's first nonfiction collection encompasses recent and previously unpublished interviews, conversations, and essays, and offers a singular snapshot of our complicated age. Each brilliant and formally inquisitive piece gives us the generous gift of Elvia's perspective on narrative and storytelling and weird fiction. Throughout, Elvia asks what the role of art and literature is today, when the human can no longer be thought of as the center of the universe and the world moves at warp speed. While it deftly negotiates the worlds of politics, science fiction, and technology in pieces like "The Protests in Hong Kong" and "Is Ornamenting Solar Panels a Crime?", this provocative book is somehow also about love, connection, and plants.

Elvia Wilk is a writer and editor living in New York. She often contributes to publications like *Frieze*, *Mousse*, *Metropolis*, and *Artforum*. From 2012 to 2016 she was a founding editor at *uncube* magazine, and from 2016 to 2018 she was the publications editor for *transmediale* and a contributing editor at *Rhizome*. Currently, she's a contributing editor at *e-flux journal* and writes a monthly column on ethical quandaries for *Monopol* magazine. She received a masters at the New School for Social Research and has taught at the University of the Arts Berlin, Eugene Lang College, and City College of New York. Her first novel, *Oval*, was published in June 2019 by Soft Skull Press. She is the recipient of a 2019 Andy Warhol Arts Writers grant and is a 2020 fellow at the Berggruen Institute.
